## The Provincial Election is April 19, 2016

**You have a right to vote.  
Enumeration is the first step.**

### WHO CAN VOTE?

Anyone who is over the age of 18, is a Canadian citizen and has lived in Manitoba for at least 6 months immediately before Election Day has the right to vote.

### WHAT'S ENUMERATION?

Enumeration is the process of going door to door to create a full list of voters to prepare for an election. Elections Manitoba will send enumerators to collect names, gender, birthdates and addresses of adults living in each home. They are identifiable by their yellow vests and signed and dated ID tag.

### WHAT?

What do you do when an enumerator comes to your house?

- Provide the enumerator with your information.
- If you are unable to give your own information, you can have someone else give the enumerator your information.

### WHEN?

Enumeration will happen from February 4, 2016 – March 7, 2016.

**WHY?**

To be able to make a choice about whether to vote, you need to be on the voters list. Enumeration is the process of going door to door to collect names for the voters list.

**ALSO**

If nobody is home when the enumerator comes, they will leave a “Sorry we missed you” door hanger.

You can still be added to the voting list by registering at your returning office. This needs to be done between March 10 and April 7.

A list of returning offices will be on the Elections Manitoba website [www.electionsmanitoba.ca](http://www.electionsmanitoba.ca) under “My Voting Information” by February 4.

If you are physically unable to attend your voting location, ask the enumerator for an application for “Homebound Voting”.
